#### Dear Friends,

I begin and end each day alone with the 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm. It may seem over-familiar to you. But the words lead me to the one who, in turbulent and chaotic circumstances, somehow has the power to reach beyond them – and guide, accompany and protect me. The Hebrew words embrace a whole network of meaning. So far, I have collected 63 different English translations!

They all agree on the Lord, the Eternal, as our Shepherd – "I lack nothing", says the Common English Bible; "I have what I need", says the Christian Standard Bible; "he cares for me always", says The Voice.

There are many ways of translating "the soul" that the Lord restores by green pasture, still waters and paths of righteousness. The Hebrew word is "nephesh" – "my life" (Contemporary English), "my inner person" (Complete Jewish Bible), "new strength" (Living Bible), "you let me catch my breath" (The Message).

"The Valley of the Shadow of Death" is "a valley of deepest darkness" (Revised English Bible), "a glen of gloom" (Moffatt), "a valley of death-shade" (Young's Literal).

The rod is to protect, and the staff is to guide, says the Amplified Bible.

And the "Mercy" (chesed) that provides the Psalm's signature is variously "lovingkindness" (Legacy Standard), "love unfailing" (New English), "loyal love" (Lexham English), "steadfast love" (Hebrew Tanakh).

I could go on....! Each word has an extra dimension, a new light, an extra nuance. But, in these difficult and challenging times, remember that these Psalms were fashioned out of conflict, need and sometimes desperation.

"Be still: and know that I am God." This instruction comes not from a green pasture but from a person within a world that is violently changing – Psalm 46, which begins, "God is our refuge and strength: a very present help in trouble."

These were the songs that sustained Jesus and the first disciples whether in Calvary, Galilee or Jerusalem. They remain a living well of inspiration for us, too.

#### PCC Secretary's Report 2025

During the course of 2024 the PCC held 8 meetings. These were very well attended with always 80% of the members attending.

In April we welcomed Rev. Steve Williams to be in overall charge of both St Margaret's and St George's churches. This is in addition to his continued service at St Gabriel's.

The PCC has once again had a very busy year, having lots of decisions to be made regarding the fabric and buildings at both churches and the halls. The repairs to the roof at St Margaret's finally started and as part of the guttering fell down, we had to have it all replaced. St George's entrance gates were in a dangerous condition and were replaced. The boilers at both churches and at the Lady Wilton Hall have given us a lot of concerns over the last 12 months and the PCC will need to address these concerns over the next 12 months. The ongoing repairs are always expensive and there have been difficult decisions have had to be made as to the priorities at each church and hall. We continue to raise funds to help with these projects and ask for your support in the coming year.

A big thank you to our Wardens at both Churches who have worked so hard on your behalf to continue our services at both Churches. There is so much work that goes unseen throughout the year, and we give thanks for all the time and effort they have given in the last 12 months.

#### St Margaret's Sunday Club

Sunday Club offers children and young people the opportunity to meet in Church House once a month. At this monthly session we begin by sitting together to share breakfast snacks, this is followed by singing, stories and craft activities to encourage children to explore and develop their faith. Our next step is to continue to support and encourage more families to attend the all-age service by liaising with the clergy team.

#### Messy Church

Messy Church is held in our parish once a month on a Wednesday at the Lady Wilton Hall in Simister 3.45 - 5.15pm. It is predominantly for primary school age children, but often younger/older children attend which is actively encouraged. Parents/Carers and often Grandparents bring the children and stay.

Messy Church was originally set up near Portsmouth, over 21 years ago. The aim was to create alternative ways and new places to worship, to complement but not replace the traditional Sunday Church Services.

Every session, tables are set out with different activities, crafts and games. These are provided in many different forms so to include all ages, preferences and abilities. It is very much child led so to encourage independence and choice while in a supportive, loving environment; skills that are very important today in an everchanging world. Photographs of the children's work are often put on the Church social media pages.

There is always a theme, linked to the lectionary, that is planned and then followed. A member of the clergy will read/tell an appropriate bible story and lead prayers before food and drinks are served. This is an important part of the ethos of Messy Church as it brings everyone together at the end of the session before they leave to go back into the community.

It is important to note that Messy Church wouldn't happen without the wonderful group of all age volunteers, who take on the many roles such as opening the hall and setting out the room, buying and preparing food, helping/serving in the kitchen and the planning/organising and managing the many different exciting activities taking place. Then of course there is the tidying up which is often done by everybody!

Please tell others about what we do. It would be lovely to see other children and their families.

The committee continue to maintain and look after the building but there are concerns that big projects will need to be financed in the near future, including replacing hand dryers and the flooring in the main hall.

#### Music and Digital Communications Report to the APCM: Jan – Dec 2024

Our churches are fabulous buildings in which to perform music, and as well as having a thriving choir that sings anthems most weeks, we hosted a concert by the Manchester Chorale in October. Whilst small in number, our choir tackles challenging rep, including music by Ralph Vaughan Williams, Karl Jenkins, Johnny Dankworth, John Rutter, Mozart and Debby Plummer. I continued visiting St Margaret's CE primary school twice weekly to run a lunchtime choir for KS2 children and lead the whole school weekly singing assemblies. We welcomed the whole school to church for an Easter service, a Harvest service in the Autumn, and a carol service just before Christmas. In the autumn term I took the school choir to the Stoller Hall for a lively singing workshop and back to the Trafford Centre for a day of singing carols and Christmas songs.

Items were posted to our blog and social media streams every day during Lent, including twice-weekly Stations of the Cross as well as seasonally appropriate hymns, anthems and readings.

Over the summer I took a sabbatical and visited other churches of the mission community for their main Sunday services. I experienced for myself the importance of a warm welcome, someone to sit with, and invitation to stay for coffee afterwards. There was a wide variety of hymns and other music, and some useful conversations about using technology in worship.

In Autumn we said au revoir to our relief pianist, Tom Davenport, who left to study trombone at Leeds conservatoire of music. We wish him well in his endeavours, and he continues to play for occasional services when back in Prestwich during his university vacations.

Throughout Advent we had our fifth online digital Advent calendar, which this year grew to three daily posts featuring bells as well as Christmas and Advent carols, hymns, anthems and readings. This was followed by daily posts for the Twelve Days of Christmas. Huge thanks again to all contributors, who sang songs, or read stories and poems. Our carol service and Midnight Christmas service were both livestreamed and well received.

We continue to post to our blog, Facebook page, Instagram and Twitter feeds daily, and these include "Our Daily Bread" prayers, reflections from the Society of St John the Evangelist, and short daily bible readings. We continue to use our public Facebook page for livestreaming services, and the private St Margaret's Community Facebook group in which we can offer each other spiritual support.

In 2024 we posted 223 articles to our blog, to which 294 people subscribe. Since establishing our website in 2016, over 94 000 people visited our website over 178 000 times. In addition, we have 564 Facebook page followers, 118 Facebook group members, 184 Twitter followers and 187 Instagram followers. Our blog consistently receives at least

2000 visitors per month, with highs of over 4000 in October 2024 (Harvest) and December 2024 (Christmas). All our blog posts are automatically 'pinged' out to Facebook, Twitter and Tumblr, from where they can also be accessed.

Finally, my sincere thanks to the dedicated singers of our parish choir, Maggie's Music Makers, and most importantly to Tom our organist.

#### **Ubi Caritas** – Maurice Duruflé (1902-1986)

This is the first of a series of four motets written by Maurice Duruflé in 1960, based on motifs of



Gregorian plainsong. The others are Tota Pulchra Es (see last month's magazine), Tu es Petrus (Thou art Peter) and Tantum Ergo (Only Then).

Ubi Caritas (where there is charity) is an antiphon for use on Maundy Thursday during the washing of feet and is attributed to Paulinus of Aquileia in 796. The melody used by Duruflé in this setting probably dates from late 8<sup>th</sup> century. The text of the prayer is:

Ubi caritas et amor, Deus ibi est. Congregavit nos in unum Christi amor.

Exsultemus et in ipso, jucundemor. Timeamus et amemus Deum vivum. Et ex corde diligamus sincero. Sincero. Ubi caritas et amor, Deus ibi est. Where there is charity and love, God is there. The love of Christ has gathered us together into one.

Let us rejoice and be glad in Him. Let us fear and love the living God. And let us love from a sincere heart. Sincere.

Where there is charity and love, God is there. Amen

I first sang this piece on a Sing for Pleasure conducting course in June 2025, and very quickly grew to love it. It's complex, set for sopranos, altos, tenor I, tenor II, bass I and bass II, so 6 voice parts in total. The first two lines are repeated, sung by only the altos, tenors and basses. The sopranos don't sing until "Exsultemus" (rejoice), adding texture in the higher register. The "Et ex corde" phrase is also repeated, and "sincero" emphasised, before the lower voices return to "Ubi caritas" and a long and elaborate Amen.

As noted in my article about "Tota Pulchra Es", Duruflé does an excellent job of mimicking plainsong and Renaissance polyphony in modern notation. This is not easy. Plainsong has no bar lines, and relies on speech rhythms. To replicate this, and accommodate female voices,



Duruflé transposed the melody up a dominant 7<sup>th</sup>, and changes time signature regularly, varying between 2, 4, 5, 6 and 8 quavers to a bar. Regardless, it's beautiful, and our parish choir has begun learning it, with the lower voice parts covered by Tom on the organ. Meanwhile, you can hear a recording of St John's Choir Elora here:
