Dear friends,

The Bethlehem Carol Sheet is having its 70th anniversary this year. Not only is it an affordable way to have in one convenient place nearly all the carols we might want to sing, but its profits support projects helping the poorest people in the Middle East. You won't find *Jingle Bells* in it, though – all the songs are suitable for singing in church.

So here is a trivia question for you: which carol doesn't mention Jesus, God or Christmas? It's one that was recorded by Bing Crosby, the Beatles and R.E.M., to name but a few. The answer is *Good King Wenceslas*. The words were written by the prolific Victorian hymn writer J. M. Neale, set to the tune of a 13th-century carol that celebrates not winter but spring.

Wenceslaus (or Wenceslas, as the carol calls him) was a Duke of Bohemia in the tenth century. He was a Christian in an era when many Bohemians were pagans, and he was born into a family marked by infighting and even murder. He became known as a wise and caring ruler with a concern for the poor, and very soon after his death he was declared to be not only a king but also a saint. Today he is the patron saint of the Czech Republic, and his statue stands in its capital city, Prague.

The carol is based on a legend. It depicts Wenceslas looking out of his window on St Stephen's Day and noticing a poor man gathering wood for his fire. He and a page set out together to take the man food, drink and firewood, even though he lives an hour's walk away, through snow and bitter wind. The page – still only a boy – struggles to keep going, so Wenceslas tells him to tread in his footsteps. There the boy finds a mysterious warmth, enabling him to continue.

St Stephen's Day, December 26th, or Boxing Day, has long been a traditional day for giving to those in need, possibly linked to the church alms boxes that were opened and distributed on that day.

In my view, the carol has a very proper place in Christian worship. It reminds us that we should remember the poor at Christmas, not only our own families, and it speaks of the strength we can find in following in the footsteps of the saints. It also reminds us that generosity is sometimes costly. Wenceslas was a saint not because of the gifts he could easily afford, but because he took them himself instead of sending a servant. The boy was there not just to guide his master, but to experience a blessing he would never forget.

As you sing from the Bethlehem Carol Sheet this year, spare a thought for the Christians in Egypt, Iraq, Israel and Palestine, Lebanon and Syria – minority communities often overlooked and sometimes persecuted. Pray that they will have peace and joy this Christmas.


Christmas Prayer of Joy:

Thorns In the Straw Graham Kendrick (1950-present)

In mid-December 2024 Rev Christine came to me with a suggestion of a new anthem for Christmas, "but not this Christmas", she said, "it's far too short notice!" I found the sheet music, loved it, checked with Tom, and bought it. We offered it at the midnight and Christmas morning services that year.

Graham Kendrick skilfully sets the scene of Mary, teenaged single mum, making an arduous journey and giving birth in a distant and dirty stable. Kendrick wonders whether she foresaw the tragedy and injustice of how her child would die... a sword shall pierce your soul...

As the child Jesus grows, Kendrick asks again whether Mary made the link between her son and the Torah prophets. As he began his ministry, did Mary fear for his future? As he died, did she link it all together?

Jesus' crown of thorns was made from acacia – each thorn around 5cm long and needle-sharp. In this song, Graham Kendrick uses these thorns as a device for Mary to understand the past, witness the present, and signpost the future. The lyrics are:

Since the day the angel came
It seemed that everything had changed
The only certain thing
Was the child that moved within
On the road that would not end
Winding down to Bethlehem
So far away from home

Just a blanket on the floor
Of a vacant cattle-stall
But there the child was born
She held him in her arms
And as she laid him down to sleep
She wondered – will it always be
So bitter and so sweet

CHORUS: And did she see there
In the straw by his head a thorn
And did she smell myrrh
In the air on that starry night
And did she hear angels sing
Not so far away
Till at last the sun rose blood-red
In the morning sky

Then the words of ancient seers
Tumbled down the centuries ...
A virgin shall conceive...
God with us... Prince of Peace
Man of Sorrows – strangest name
Oh Joseph there it comes again
So bitter yet so sweet

And as she watched him through the years Her joy was mingled with her tears And she'd feel it all again The glory, and the shame And when the miracles began She wondered, who is this man And where will this all end

'Til against a darkening sky
The son she loved was lifted high
And with his dying breath
She heard him say 'Father forgive'
And to the criminal beside
"Today – with me in Paradise"
So bitter yet so sweet

CHORUS

I particularly like this song because it doesn't sanitise the circumstances of the first Christmas. It looks ahead, unblinking, to Easter, and the reason for Christ's birth here on earth. For similar reasons, if I'm offered a choice of which king's verse to sing in "We Three Kings", I always choose Balthazar: "Myrrh is mine; its bitter perfume breathes a life of gathering gloom — sorrowing, sighing, bleeding, dying, sealed in a stone-cold tomb."

Maggie's Music Makers: Not a "Proper" Choir

Our parish has quite a reputation locally for the quality of music in worship. Imagine my surprise when I heard our choir described recently (by a regular and longstanding parishioner) as not a "proper" choir. I asked for clarification. Apparently, that bold statement was made because

- 1. The choir does not wear robes, and
- 2. The singers are "very shy" and won't sit up at the front.

This got me thinking, and I did some digging. Here are my research queries, and what I discovered.

What is the purpose of a church choir?

ChurchLeadership.com (https://www.churchleadership.com/leading-ideas/four-functions-church-choir/) tells us that there are three main purposes of a church choir:

- 1. To lead and enliven the congregation's song
- 2. To sing beautiful and challenging music that the congregation cannot, enhancing worship and praising God
- 3. To serve as a small group within the church for faith formation

Taking these in turn, our choir knows the hymns that are to be sung each week. They are practiced at the preceding weekly rehearsal, and sometimes ahead of the service, in order to lead the congregation and help them learn new hymns. With a small congregation that sits scattered about the rear of the nave, it is helpful to have a group of confident singers leading the hymns to prevent congregational singers feeling isolated, and as if they are the only one singing.

Most weeks we sing an anthem that is appropriate to the liturgical season. Usually this is whilst communion is distributed, but the traditional time is straight after the sermon. The congregation would then hear the Word (in the bible readings), have the Word explained (in the sermon), and hear it applied (in the anthem). We sing a rich and diverse variety of music from all around the world, from each of the past five centuries, and sometimes we even sing music that has been written by women! We usually sing in at least 2-part harmony, sometimes 3-part harmony, and dedicate the bulk of our rehearsal time to doing this well. Our repertoire includes music by (in no particular order) Duruflé, Britten, Quartel, Jenkins, Boyce, Redman, Purcell, Rutter, Humperdinck, Handel, Cohen and Mozart.

Our choir members attend church each week first and foremost to express their faith and to worship God. Note that singing hymns and anthems during church services is an act of worship, and not any kind of performance. Learning and practising hymns and anthems for

several weeks ahead of time creates a bond between us that runs deep. We care for and support each other in our musical and spiritual development – and we have fun together along the way.

What is the minimum number of singers for a church choir?

This depends on many variables, but the general agreement from the choral community is at least two voices per part. As we have 2 x Soprano I, 4 x Soprano II and 3 x alto, plus Tom and I, we meet numeric criteria for an upper voice choir.

Does a church choir have to wear robes?

The Guild of Church Musicians (https://gcm.org.uk/everything-else-an-organist-should-know/2-running-a-choir/#ch10.1) tells us that there is nothing in canon law covering the robes a choir may or may not wear. However, there is a lot of custom and practice around this issue. Reasons for wearing robes:

- 1. Uniformity all choir members are equal before God, regardless of social demographics
- 2. Professionalism robes can instil a sense of purpose and seriousness in a choir's ministry
- 3. Symbolism in some churches, robes are worn to visually connect the choir to ministerial attire worn by clergy

Reasons for not wearing robes:


- 1. Comfort and practicality robes can be very hot and cumbersome; they also present a trip hazard when walking up and down steps, and when kneeling to receive communion and rising again afterwards
- 2. Modernisation absence of choir robes gives a more contemporary and accessible feel to the music, better reflecting the diversity of the congregation
- 3. Cultural fit in some churches, robes are considered too formal or 'stuffy'

Our choir chooses, for practical and musical reasons, not to wear robes, and this decision does not impact on our ability to sing in any way.

Where in church should the choir sit?

Again, there is <u>nothing</u> in canon law about this. The "right" place for a church choir depends on theology, architecture, acoustics, and tradition. There are several common placements, each with its own purpose, pros and cons. There are given here, along with implications for St Margaret's:

 The Chancel (front of the church, facing the congregation – we don't have space for this at St Margaret's)



Why choirs sit here:

- They can easily lead the congregation in singing
- Direct communication with the clergy and organist (but our organist sits to the side and is impossible to see from the chancel)
- Common in Protestant churches

Pros:

- Clear leadership in worship
- Strong visual presence

Cons:

- Can feel like a performance if not thoughtfully arranged
- Blocks the congregation's view of the altar
- 2. Choir Loft or Rear Balcony (over the narthex a superb place to sing from, but we have neither narthex nor balcony at St Margaret's)

Why choirs sit here:

- Historically common when organs are at the back
- Sound projects well over the congregation
- Allows worshippers to focus on worship rather than the choir

Pros:

- Excellent acoustics
- Less distracting visually

Cons:

- Harder for the choir to feel connected to the liturgy
- Limited space in some buildings

3. Choir Stalls facing each other in the chancel (previously favoured in St Margeret's, and traditional in Anglican, Catholic, Orthodox and monastic settings)

Why choirs sit here:

- This antiphonal arrangement supports call-and-response singing which we rarely use
- It mirrors ancient worship practices but it's 2025!

Pros:

- Ideal for liturgical chant
 which we do not do
- Symbolises the choir as part of the worship leadership, not performers

Cons:

- Choir is behind the altar and feels excluded from worship
- In St Margaret's, singing in the chancel cannot be heard by the congregation
- Due to St Margaret's architecture and acoustics, singers in the chancel sing at least one beat behind the organ and congregation – so it's just as well they cannot be heard!
- 4. Front Side Seating (currently favoured at St Margaret's)

Why choirs sit here:

- Easy access for movement during worship
- Direct connection with organist/pianist

Pros:

- Choir can see the altar and take part in worship
- Choir can be heard by the congregation

Cons:

Can't think of any




